## MIXING MATERIALS

While we often gravitate to materials such as wood and marble in kitchens, there are plenty of alternative surfaces, which can bring a unique texture into the space. Experiment with these unusual materials in small areas or try contrasting reflective metals with matt surfaces to create drama.

#### [1] A FOCAL POINT

A large stainless-steel island, finished in a bronze PVD coating, takes centre stage in this 'Convivium' kitchen by Arclinea. It bounces light around the room and subtly reflects the other elements of the space. A recessed base prevents the island from looking heavy. Kitchens start at  $\pounds 45,000$ . *arclinea.com* 

### [2] BOLD AS BRASS

In this Boffi kitchen, designer Peter Mikic has juxtaposed sawn walnut kitchen units with a textured brass island. Mouth-blown glass pendants contribute to the rich and opulent aesthetic; their transparency forms a pleasing contrast with the other solid materials. #### [3] HEAVY METALS

Part of Ledbury Studio's 'Metallics' collection, this kitchen mixes aged verdigris copper fronts with aged brass handles and units hand painted with a burnished effect. Floor-to-ceiling cupboards are made from a hummocky dark stained oak – a finish described as 'choppy water'. Some of the hollows have been enlivened with gold leaf.
