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




KITCHENDINERS

The non-kitchen space

If your kitchen is the main place where you not only cook, but relax and entertain as well, creating a softer look by making the cabinetry look less kitchen like can help create a cosier feel. In this Chelsea pied-à-terre, designers at Ledbury Studio were presented with a challenge: despite its relatively compact proportions of 5m x 7m, the homeowners wanted to slot in a well-equipped kitchen, plus distinct dining and living areas. The brief was that the cabinetry should be another piece of furniture in the room, enhancing its overall look while appealing to the owners' eclectic style. To do this, much of the functionality has been hidden behind aged-pewter doors, meaning all you see is a collection of handmade pieces of furniture, which echo other designs elsewhere in the room. This helps the space to morph flexibly between its functions since even when you're dining or lounging in the living area, you have a beautiful view. To further ensure the kitchen is a seamless extension of the neighbouring zone, there are no wall cupboards. Instead, open shelving adds a place for decorative items and keepsakes that add a dose of personality.
